Throughout the course of my six months at Our Savior, When Helping Hurts has been a book that has returned to the center of my concentration no less than three times. As a result, I've been doing a lot of thinking about how Poverty alleviation occurs when the power of Christ's resurrection reconciles our key relationships through the transformation of both individual lives and local, national, and international systems.

we can use When Helping Hurts at Our Savior relating to both relationship building and poverty alleviation.

In *When Helping Hurts*, Brian Fikkert makes a point that is shocking at first glance, but remarkably accurate after more thought. Without getting into the book's contents too much, poverty has to do with relationships much more than simply material possessions, not the least of which is our relationship with our God. He asserts that the first step to poverty alleviation is simply "hanging out". Having a network of supportive relationships is vital to moving past the many obstacles that worsen or prevent the escape from poverty. The resources and encouragement that a network of relationships brings can literally change lives, and that is exactly the business that Jesus is in, life change.

As a result, a team of OSL members and I are currently planning an event for the people of Lansing that will be a first-step towards building relationships in the Lansing area, specifically in the area of Lansing that has the most poverty. In a 1-mile wide circle around the Our Savior Food Bank at our previous location, nearly a quarter of households are below the poverty line, and nearly half of the households with children are single-mother homes. Even better, with the Food Bank and historical location of Our Savior right in the middle, we already have a "foot in the door" serving people and growing relationships. What a great area to join with Jesus on His mission to bring all people to Himself!

Chromebook Charging Stations

What happened to the extra church mailboxes from the lobby? A question with a very cool answer. With the greatly appreciated help of the Wednesday crew the mailboxes were transformed into

Chromebook charging stations. Having 63 Chromebooks in the school, a solution to keeping them charged as well as organized was needed.

The Chromebooks fit so well in the mail slots it was like they were designed for this purpose. With 25 devices to a classroom, the 45 slots in the mail boxes were a little too much. The bottom 15 slots were cut away to make a more compact 30 slot station. A 24 outlet power strip was mounted on top, cables were plugged in and ran through the newly drilled holes to power a full class set.

There are 3 stations in total. One for 8th grade, one for 7th and 6th grade home room and one for the new set of 20 shared devices stored in the server room. Each slot is labeled with a number to its matching device. Next year the server room station will find a new home in 6th grade. Another charging station is already in the works to replace the shared class set station when it moves.

In college, Pastor Wangelin and his wife Kristin sang in the Concordia Ann Arbor choir under the direction of Jeffrey Blersch. Harlan and Kelli Schaedig had Dr. Blersch as a professor for music classes and Kelli took organ lessons from him. I asked Pastor to share with us some memories about the choir and also the upcoming May 30 hymn festival.

What are some memories that you have of singing with the Concordia Ann Arbor choir?

Singing in the Concordia Choir was a highlight of my college years, where I made great friends, traveled on tours, and experienced many worshipful moments of sacred music in the chapel of the Holy Trinity and many other churches. Many of our friends in choir are now pastors, teachers, and church workers, and people we keep in touch with.

One of the best memories from the Concordia Choir was the opportunity to sing in the chapel of the Holy Trinity on campus. Our home concerts, daily chapel, the Boar's Head Festival at Christmas time, and special services like Reformation Day and the District Convention gave us ample opportunities to sing tremendous works in an inspiring setting.

My other favorite memory of singing with Dr. Blersch is how fun he was on choir tours. We laughed, worked, ate, and sang our way across the Midwest, in a day before people had their personal entertainment devices or cell phones. We really bonded with the group and with our director on those trips.

How was Dr. Blersch as a director?

We loved singing for Dr. Blersch, who challenged us in his gentle way to musical excellence. When asked how to pronounce his name, he said, "It's the sound a small pebble makes when tossed in a pond. Blersch!" The ripple effects of Dr. Blersch's music conducting, his organ capabilities, and personal devotion to his Savior, Jesus Christ, made a strong impact on us, and we have great respect and admiration for him.

Why should people consider attending the hymn festival?

The Hymn Festival is not just a concert with great music, but a sacred concert that glorifies our Lord Jesus Christ, and makes a joyful noise to the Rock of our Salvation. It gives both musicians and attendees the opportunity to sing familiar songs with impressive arrangements, and to hear new pieces performed by the composer. It gives us a deeper appreciation for sacred music composition when you personally meet the composer and hear how their faith is expressed in the notes and words of the songs. Have you had a marriage check up lately? Like many of you, I have my teeth cleaned at the dentist office twice a year, I have an annual physical each year at my doctor's office, and I try to keep up with preventative maintenance by doing the doctor recommended tests and screenings. But what about our marriages? How often do we take the time to check up on how healthy they are? Do you have regular times of conversation with your spouse in which you develop long-range family planning, evaluate strengths and growth areas, and share feelings and dreams? If you do not take the time to work on your marriage and do the preventative maintenance, a lot of things can go wrong. Pastor Rob Rienow explains that there are a lot of things riding on your marriage. One of them is the very foundation of our nation. That seems like a stretch, but Rienow eloquently explains the connection in a short video titled "Marriage and the Great Commission."

It really is a useful tool for couples to use every few years in order to help evaluate their marriage and celebrate successes while evaluating those potential changes that may need to be made. As a Prepare/Enrich facilitator I can objectively view the results and offer suggestions and conversation that will open the necessary dialogue between husbands and wives. The cost is \$35, and that is a small investment to make in such an important part of your life.
