

We've all probably heard the old wives' tale that spending time outdoors when the weather turns colder can make us sick – but it turns out that playing outdoors (even in colder weather) can actually make our bodies (and minds) healthier! It's true: research shows that as long as we dress for the weather to prevent



frost bite and dangerously low body temperatures, the fresh air and connection with our earth's natural elements may even improve our overall health and immune system function.

In our Early Childhood classes, we revel in and celebrate all types of weather. Children love to play in the rain, splash in mud puddles, build sand castles with sand dampened by the rain, and observe how the grass crunches and puddles glaze over with ice when the

Children also learn independence skills as we teach them how to dress for the weather and how to put on their own hats, mittens, coats, boots, rain suits, and snow pants. We talk about all weather as a blessing from God – sun, rain, warmth, cold, wind, snow – it is all part of God's perfect creation and all works together for a purpose. Leaves turn colors and drop to the ground, creating materials for animals to make shelters with for the winter. Flocks of geese and sandhill cranes fly overhead toward places to our south in order to stay warm for the

winter. Rain falls to water plants and help vegetables and fruits to grow to the nourishment of our bodies. Indeed, God gives all of His creation everything we need. What a joy it is to watch our youngest students learn to love the Lord through their play and interactions in nature – and to help raise them up as good stewards and caretakers of the gifts God has granted us all.










# Gether We Are Making A Difference

#### Technology In Our Families

Recently three members of our congregation - Jordan Miller and John and Nicole Conner - led a Sunday morning milestone class for 4th grade students and their parents. The milestone was about technology. Fourth grade is an excellent age to be able to talk about the joys and dangers of technology.

Ryan and Shelly LaFeve, who with their daughter Leah attended the class said, "It was nice to get together with other parents who are working through technology

issues like us. This class should be available congregation wide....we could have filled two hours easily."



A question for all of us to ponder when it comes to technology is this: What does your family room look like? It may seem like an odd question, but it speaks to the priorities of our time spent together and our rest time as families. I'm actually not going to recommend that you set up your family room in a specific way, but rather use that as an example for how we set up our family time. Is your family time centered around the TV? Does your family time involve being together, but engrossed in your phones, ipads, or computers?

Andy Crouch, the author of The Tech-Wise Family, utilizes a strategy involving space and time in order to keep his family producing things like art, writing, and music. His family has living spaces designated for creativity and family time. These spaces have a limited place for technology. All computers, phones, and game systems are stored elsewhere so that the family

can be together and be engaged in some activity with each other.

utilize technology. Yes, technology has so many blessings. Yes, many types of technology bring us great joy and assistance, making life easier, but technology can also take us away from those people who are the most important people in our life our family members. Therefore, it is important to put technology in the proper place and use it at the proper time.

#### The Family Technology Challenge


- 1. Try eliminating the use of technology (no TV, no computers, etc) for one hour while everyone is home.
- 2. After you have mastered the art of no technology for an hour, try no technology for an entire day. This one might be a little tricky to pull off. Try it on a weekend or during vacation or holiday breaks.
- 3. Finally, Choose one entire week sometime during the next year when you and your family abstain from the use of technology.

This is not an essay on the evils of technology. Rather, it is simply information designed to make you think about how you spend time together as a family. How do you use time and space within your home? Too often we waste our time together by being immersed in social media, mindless TV-watching, gaming, texting, internet surfing, and other uses of technology. When we do this, we forget how to communicate with each other. We forget how to share the highs and lows of our day with one another. We forget to ask questions of one another. We forget to listen - really

listen to understand each other.

Find some things to do together that require interaction. Create something, make meals together. Bake things. Play games together - both indoors and outdoors. Have conversations and devotions with your family. Do things that require conversation and being together. That is family life!

We rejoice in the marvelous gifts within technology that we have been blessed with, but we also want to partner with families like we did during the 4th grade technology milestone class to talk about how to keep technology in its proper place.
