## List of the Apostles: Matthew 10:1-4; Mark 3:13-19; Luke 6:12-1; Acts 1:12-14

#### What kind of people are they?

The passages listed give a comprehensive list of who the apostles were. Jesus had many other disciples, those who followed him around and listened to his teachings. The apostles had a bit of a different role than that of your everyday disciple. That being said, we don't know for sure what each disciple's <u>profession</u> was, but we do know some of them.

Peter, Andrew, James, and John were all <u>fishermen</u>. We read this in *Matthew 4:18-22, Mark 1:16-20,* and *Luke 5:1-11*. Matthew, also known as <u>Levi</u> from *Mark 2:13-17* and *Luke 5:27-32* was a <u>tax collector</u>.

Another disciple we are told about is <u>Simon the Zealot</u>. The Zealots were Jewish religious fanatics that opposed foreign rule. Often they did this through extreme acts such as <u>assassination</u> and <u>terrorism</u>.

From all of this we can know that there really wasn't anything <u>extraordinary</u> about who the disciples were. They were somewhat ordinary people who Jesus appeared to and called them to be his disciple.

# What were they like?

Jesus' disciples had <u>faults</u> just like we do. They didn't always understand what Jesus was saying. They didn't always react the right way. They <u>doubted</u>. They didn't always have the strongest <u>faiths</u>. They were defensive. Take heart and know that Jesus <u>also calls</u> you today to be his disciple.

Jesus call to all of his disciples is one that requires them to let go of all that they once held onto or once held to be important. His call is to deny <u>yourself</u> and to pick up your <u>cross</u>.

## Modern Day Disciple:

Denying yourself and carrying your cross isn't inflicting pain upon yourself. Rather, "to deny oneself is to be <u>aware</u> only of <u>Christ</u> and no more of self to see only him who goes before..." (Bonhoeffer, *Cost of Discipleship 88*).

Paul speaks of this in *Philippians 3:2-11*. Let's turn there.

The focus of our discipleship is only on <u>Jesus</u> and what he has done for us. What does it mean to be a modern day disciple?

As disciples of Jesus here and now it is very clear that we live differently. We work differently. We think differently. We talk differently. We witness differently
