What Is The Church?

Dear Saints, November 2020 is coming. . . and with it comes the joyous Feast of All Saints Day!

In 1539 Martin Luther wrote a stunning work: On the Councils and the Churches. In this, he confesses:

"See that you exercise and confirm your faith, so that when you are

troubled or when sin is besetting you, you go to the Sacrament and heartily desire it, and what it signifies, and do not doubt that it will be done unto you as the Sacrament declares, that Christ *and all His saints* will draw near to you with all their virtues, sufferings, and graces, to live, work, rest, suffer, and die with you, and be so fully yours that they have all things in common with you. If you are willing to practice this belief and confirm it, you will experience what a rich and joyful wedding-meal your God has prepared for you on the altar."

You see, if all who share the bread are one body in Christ, then the bread that is Christ's body unites us together as a whole: all the saints are there where Christ is. And so they constantly pray for us too. Dr. Luther again on the subject a few years earlier (1528, Sermon on John

17):

"For to everyone who believes through the word of the Apostles, the promise is given for Christ's



sake and by the power of this prayer [John 17], that he shall be one body and one loaf with all Christians; that what happens to him as a member for good or for ill, shall happen to the whole body for good or ill, and not only one or two saints, but all the prophets, martyrs, apostles, all Christians, both on earth and with God in Heaven, shall suffer and conquer with him, shall fight for him, help, protect, and save him, and shall undertake for him such a gracious exchange that they will all bear his sufferings, want, and afflictions and he partake of their blessings, comfort, and joy. What man could wish for anything more blessed than to come into this fellowship or brotherhood and be made a member of this body, which is called Christendom?"

Where Christ, there His saints. This is the confidence in which Christians live out their lives. When we gather for the Lord's Supper we know that the biggest part of the gathering is never seen. Hebrews 12 has opened our eyes. We can rejoice that together we [all the saints] form a single body and that all of us have our life only in Him who is the Lamb once slain.

Small Groups and smaller groups - It's Time

It's time! It's time to connect with a small group. Our small group ministry grew immensely last year! It has been encouraging to see so many people joining a small group. It is always great to dig deeper in God's word or to discuss the sermon study guide from one of Pastor's or Vicar's sermons. During this time it is even more important than ever to connect with a small group of people and discuss scripture, discipleship, and life with others who desire a stronger faith.



This year we are going small in order to go big. As we read in many parts of Luther's small Catechism: What does this mean? Going smaller in a small group refers to a few different options:

First, we believe that close connection, trust, and encouragement can be very effective in a **"huddle." A huddle is a smaller group of 4-6 people who gather on a regular basis to spur one another toward discipleship.** As Christians, one of our primary responsibilities as well as one of the privileges of knowing Christ is the chance to bring others to the



knowledge of Him.

An ideal huddle experience would be committing to meeting each week for a 6-week period. During this time this smaller group gathers in person or via Zoom to talk about ways to minister to other people – unchurched friends, new Christians, neighbors, or just someone who may be struggling in his or her faith. It's not just talk, however. Questions such as, "Who have you been praying for lately?" or "Who could use your personal investment of time and mentoring?" will be shared, and huddle members will hold each other accountable for doing the mission of discipleship.

A second smaller group option is triads. These groups of three are a necessary way to promote friendship, mentoring, and strengthening of faith. Triads work in a similar way to huddles. A triad is made up of three people of the same gender. The purpose of this is to promote closer friendship through the mentoring of a same gender friend. So, for example, a younger man might seek out a mentor who he can learn from. Perhaps even a couple of "seasoned" Christians can meet with a new Christian for times of discussion, prayer, and even informal instruction. Or perhaps a mature Christian woman might seek out a couple of other women to mentor.

It's up to you to seek out others who could be a part of your 6-week journey. it's time to get to know someone at OSL better and on a deeper level. There will be a set of 5 questions for huddles and triads to discuss each week. These will be available on our website – <u>oursaviorlansing.org</u> under "ministries" and then "small groups" later in September. We are excited to provide three different 6-week sets of questions focusing on *Learn, Live, and Share Christ.*

What an opportunity to connect! Step out boldly and go smaller to go big with a huddle or triad. It's time!

The Gift of Music

Music has shown to be an effective treatment for a very large variety of mental and physical illnesses. This is consistent with God's intentions for music as stated in the Bible. Colossians 3:16 says, "Let the message of Christ dwell among you richly as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom through psalms, hymns, and songs from the Spirit, singing to God with gratitude in your hearts." If music wasn't so effective in promoting our spiritual and emotional well being, there's no reason for it to be so prevalent in our worship. God intends for our music to glorify Him, but also to actively take care of ourselves and

maintain mental and spiritual wellness.

In Corinthians, Paul writes letters about spiritual gifts. To Paul, all gifts came from God. Paul sees people challenged to use their abilities to build up and strengthen the church. Sadly, the Corinthians were misusing their spiritual gifts and destroying the city rather than building the city up. Paul spoke of gifts like teaching and hospitality that can be natural abilities and can be improved through practice. Just as we find in Romans chapter 3, the body (the church, the kingdom) has many members and we are to use our gifts for God's purpose. If it is to prophesy, prophesy. If it is to serve, serve. If it is to teach, teach. If it is to encourage, offer encouragement. In addition, Paul also recognized supernatural gifts given extraordinary and suddenly. The Lord is always at work as we apply our spiritual gifts in the

same and in the different of this school year.

There are different kinds of gifts, but the same Spirit distributes them. There are different kinds of service, but the same Lord. There are different kinds of working, but in all of them and in everyone it is the same God at work. ~ 1 Corinthians 12:4-5

Same and different. These are words that would describe our school experiences this year. We recently began the 2020-2021 school year at Our Savior Lutheran. Eager students and parents arrived for the first days anticipating the re-opening of our

school. They were greeted with excited teachers and staff awaiting their arrival. This was the same as any past school year. The difference became apparent as students received a wellness check upon arrival. While every student had their temperature checked, a staff member or a volunteer welcomed them and briefly chatted with them. Who knew fifteen seconds could be valuable time with each and every child upon entering the school building? What a personable and spirit-filled connection with our young people on a daily basis, a face to face

greeting. This new morning procedure is one of many new and different protocols set forth by the Michigan School Roadmap and our own preparedness plan. Yet what remained the same was the hallway greetings, the opening of lockers, and the students interacting and visiting with one another (six feet apart, of course). Oh...and plenty of joy and laughter, even if it was covered by a mask.

Same and different...in weekly chapel. Chapel this year begins a little later in the morning then past years (that's different). What is even more different is that we offer two chapel experiences for specific students. To practice worship guidelines in chapel, we have grades 4-8 worship at 9:10am and grades K-3 worship at 9:55am. Worship is livestreamed for our at-home learners who preferred to distance learn for the time being. We are thankful that even our parents and congregation members can participate in weekly chapel. The chapel experience is very similar to Sunday morning worship at Our Savior with students wearing masks and seated four pew cushions away and seated in every other pew row. Yet when chapel begins, the same songs are lead by our same student praise team song leaders, the same Bible shares scripture passages to guide our ways and bring us hope, the same prayers are lifted, and a children's message is conveyed to our youngest and oldest participants. Worship may look a little different but the purpose and joy in

worship remains the same.

Same and different...lunch time. Hot lunch is served to the classrooms as food is prepared and plated by Mrs. Terri Shaver. In her twenty plus years of OSL, this year's menu and lunch procedures have never looked so different. The lunchroom (Commons area) is empty. This is really different. The food is delivered on multiple carts to each classroom. The preparation is the same, the procedures are systematic and different, yet the heart for providing a quality meal to the children remains hugely the same.



With the students eating at their cleaned desk space after proper hand cleaning and sanitizing, the laughter and shared conversations between students remains the same.

Student learning looks both the same and different. Objectives align with curriculum standards as inperson (85% of the K8 student body) and online (15%) students learn how to learn and apply their ideas and knowledge. Teachers are attentive to social and emotional needs of students as we return to learning this fall. What is different is that nearly every teacher has students joining their classroom from home via Google Meets or Zoom. Students reconnect with their at-home classmates and the
