Protect Young Eyes: an Event for Families

Protect Young Eyes (PYE for short) is an organization that specializes in internet safety for families, schools, and churches. Chris McKenna, founder and CEO of PYE, came to OSL on Monday, November 9, and shared a presentation with parents and students in 6th-12th grade about the Digital Culture of Kids.



What Chris shared with parents and families was extremely relevant, research-based, and most importantly, it was faith-based. We all need help using the internet well, not just kids. Protect Young Eyes seeks to give parents tools to teach their kids to use technology well.

Becky Grocki, who live-streamed the event with her family said, "As a parent, my biggest fear is that my child will encounter things online that are not healthy for them spiritually and mentally. The idea of coaching and working with my children instead of an us vs. them scenario is what I want for our family. Instead of being nervous about my kids and technology, I feel ready to build on our relationship with each other and technology that is based on



knowledge instead of fear."

The presentation concluded by covering two very important topics: pornography and online predators. We might be tempted to think "not my child" because we are part of a wonderful Christian community here at OSL. Chris made it very clear that we should assume our children will encounter these things and that parents can prepare them and give them the tools to handle these situations appropriately.

When asked about what he hopes families take away from this event, Chris McKenna said, "my hope is that parents who hear this information will then sit down and have awesome conversations about technology. We can't avoid it, we can't expect our kids to figure it out on their own, so we want to be parents who show them the way"

Additionally, McKenna hopes that, "when parents have questions that they're not afraid to look for answers." The Protect Young Eyes website (https://protectyoungeyes.com/) is

an awesome place for parents to start looking for answers and resources to guide them.

What is the Hmong Ministry?

Who are the Hmong?

The Hmong is a distinct group of people who originated from China dating back to the 14th Century. After many civil wars with the Chinese during the 18th Century, many Hmong migrated to Southeast Asia. Eventually, they made their homes on the mountain tops of North Vietnam, Laos, and Thailand. The Hmong value freedom and democracy; and supported the French during their colonization of

Southeast Asia in the late 19th Century. Later, they supported the United States' effort to prevent the communists from taking Laos' control in the 1960s. In this capacity, the Hmong became an alliance of the United States in a Secret War against the North Vietnamese communist. After the Vietnam war ended in 1975, the Hmong were targeted by the communists for persecution. They had limited choices and many of them fled to the refugee camps in Thailand and eventually resettled in other areas like the US, Canada, Australia, France, and South America.

What is the traditional Hmong religion?

The majority of the Hmong people practice the religion of worshiping the spirits. Sociologists and anthropologists labeled the Hmong religion as "Animism – The Ways of the Spirits." Some of the spirits are good, while others are bad. The core belief of the Hmong religion is reincarnation. Ninety percent of the Hmong in North America still believe in their traditional religion. We must pray for them and work together to bring them the Good News that Christ is the Ultimate sacrifice. Through Christ, they have eternal life with the Creator of the Universe.

Settled in Lansing

Many of the Hmong families have settled in the Lansing area. Some of the families became members or Our Savior over forty years ago. After former Hmong Pastor Zong Houa Yang move to Florida, the Michigan District approved Pastor Lang Yang in 2004 to serve St. Michael's Hmong ministry with the partnership of Our Savior Lutheran Church in Lansing– Hmong Ministry and the Michigan District. Through the Ethnic Immigrant Institute of Theology, he continued his education to be ordained and called in 2008 as Associate Pastor for St. Michael's while serving Our Savior.



Hmong Ministry Today

The Hmong Ministry continues to worship at St. Michael's on the second and fourth Saturday of each month and Our Savior every Sunday. Pastor Yang also serves as President of the Hmong Mission Society, networking with all LCMS Hmong Ministries in North America and Southeast Asia. He helped plant the Hmong Ministry at Redeemer Lutheran Church in Chugiak, Alaska, in 2013. He continues to serve the community, state, and nation through his effort as Chaplain for Denmark Township, Tuscola County Sheriff Department, and the Civil Air Patrol – United States Air Force Auxiliary. During Pastor Yang's tenure, he helped the Hmong Ministry publishing the new Hmong Lutheran Hymnal "Phoo Ntawv Hawm Hab Qhua Vaajtswv" with liturgical music notes; it took eleven years in the making.

Pastor Yang and his wife, Phoua, also translated Pastor Bob Smith's prayer book "Keep Me and Keep All – Ceev Kuv Hab Ceev Txhua Tug" into the Hmong Blue Dialect. He just finished the translation of Luther Small Catechism and is in the process of having it printed.

During Pastor Yang's sixteen years of pastoral ministry, he continued to pursue higher education receiving his Master of Divinity, Doctor of Ministry, and the army appointed him as Chaplain (1Lt) with the United States Army Reserve. Pastor Yang continues to serve God's people at Our Savior and St. Michaels, and worldwide. Soli Deo gloria – Glory to God.

Is Your Family Fire-Safe?

October was fire-safety month. With everything else going on in the world, it is easy to forget about anything not related to COVID-19 or elections. But, especially for families with young children, fire safety is an extremely important topic. Is your home equipped with proper fire safety equipment and is your family prepared for a fire-related emergency? Children and families have endured quite a lot of stress lately, so parents may be hesitant to talk to their children about topics that could potentially cause more stress. However, being prepared for emergencies can be stress-less and may even prevent the stress related to not having a family safety plan.

The Red Cross (redcross.org) has many tips on how to prepare your home and family for a fire-related emergency. Among them, having a working smoke detector on every level of your home and in each bedroom/sleeping area is paramount. Check the batteries each month and replace batteries once a year (or more often, if needed).





Create a fire escape plan and family meeting place outside of the home and practice the plan with your children at least twice a year. Teach your children what the smoke alarm sounds like and show them how to get low and crawl out following the escape plan to avoid smoke inhalation. Emphasize "get out and stay out" with children, making sure they know never to re-enter the house even for other family members or prized possessions. Finally, practice "stop, drop, and roll" to put out fire on clothing.

Other considerations for home fire-safety include purchasing a fire extinguisher and keeping it in an area near fire-prone spots, like in a kitchen pantry. If your home has multiple levels or you live in an upper-level apartment, consider purchasing fire escape ladders for sleeping areas on second or third floors, learn how to use them, and store them near windows. And, if your home has security devices on windows or doors like bars on windows, consider utilizing quick-release devices which allow for easy removal from inside the home to ensure your family is not trapped inside.

Especially in this COVID-era, our homes are truly our sanctuaries. Many people have spent more time at home than ever before this year, so protecting our families at home is more important than ever. learning and activities that engage our students. Thank you for your prayers and extraordinary patience and adaptability this school year. The parent and staff cooperation and understanding during this pandemic has been critical in keeping our school open and safe.

We marvel at God's handiwork as he guides His people, and in particular, our school ministry. Each day in school is truly a gift. Sure, this comment was commonly made in prior school years. Yet the challenges of this

current school year have caused us to be thankful and grateful for our school family and community. This past week I witnessed the following blessings that we see day to day while providing Christian education within a pandemic.

• Walking the hallways we hear the classroom noise and laughter, we see the playground interactions of classmates, and we see the miles of smiles from students each day. Praise be to God for our school and in-person learning

• Our church staff has been much involved in the day-to-day school activities with teaching Catechism, eating lunch with students, and supervising an occasional recess or lunch period. Jointly school and church serve as one.

• With 179 K-8 students including 30 new students this school year, close to 90% are inperson learning. 11% are using our distance learning platform that includes virtual participation in classroom devotions, course work, and live classrooms. Nearly each day includes a virtual lunch with an in-person and online learner.

 We have found ways for volunteers to assist with daily activities. Nearly every morning we have four volunteers welcoming students as Crosswalk Guards and wellness check greeters. Students arrive to

multiple face-to-face greetings before even arriving to their classroom. We are thankful for parents and church members who

volunteer their time in warmly greeting students each day.

- OSL parents have been encouragers and our biggest supporters. They realize the blessing of in-person and the sacrifice our teachers are making professionally for hybrid instruction and personally for health in the classroom.
- OSL teachers...they strive...they adapt...they are giving their best...they know the risks, they know the great rewards of teaching and sharing the faith with online and in-person learners.

We truly take heart in the Lord as God is greater than our ups and downs. We stay united in faith and committed to relationships and learning as our school journey continues.
