God marks us as His own, and names us as His beloved child in our baptism. God puts His name on us – the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen! This has been a **season for baptisms** at Our Savior, with a baptism taking place each weekend for seven Sundays in a row. Among these baptisms are four adults, several OSL students, and a number of newborns. The adults are taking a big step of faith as they profess Christ and are baptized. As students are baptized, their teachers stand alongside parents and sponsors, to recognize their ministry to these families. At the baptism of infants, parents make promises to raise their children in the Christian faith. God welcomes people of all ages and all nations to be a part of His family and His eternal kingdom.

This gives us all the opportunity to **reflect on our own baptism**, however long ago that was. Where were you baptized, when did it take place, who performed the baptism? These are things we can share with family and friends as we reflect on God's claim on our life. More importantly, how does your baptism make you different in this world? God calls us to be salt and light, and to have the Spirit of Christ in us. Our baptism is our calling to live as Christian people in this dark world.

Then, as we **live the baptized life**, trusting in Jesus and living for Him, we share the Good News of God's grace and forgiveness in Christ with those around us. Our world certainly needs that Good News! It needs to hear God's Words of Law and Gospel, the call to repent and believe, and the invitation to be baptized into Christ and be born again into a living hope – one that can never perish, spoil, or fade (1 Peter 1:3-4). We are Easter people, people of hope, because of Jesus' resurrection and the free gift of salvation through faith alone.

This summer, as we enjoy the beauty of God's creation, remember God's goodness to you in Christ. When you jump in the pool or take a dip in the lake, remember your baptism. When you bask in the sun, remember God's face shines on you. Living the baptized life is about being joined to Jesus by grace and joining Jesus in His mission by the power of the Holy Spirit. That's what Our Savior Lutheran Church and School is all about.

How old is Ida? What is her favorite food and thing to do?


Ida is almost 22 months old; she'll be 2 July 28th!

Family Faith Walks: On-the-Go Faith Activities



Imagine

Dear Saints,

Greetings in the name of our Lord, Jesus Christ! With the recent birth and Baptism of our son, Gabriel Thomas Heinze, I thought it would be appropriate to have a section on Baptism. The text we will look at is Romans 6:3-4, perhaps my favorite baptismal passage in Holy Scripture.

Let's allow our imagination to go wild with this text. Baptism, St. Paul says, is dying with Christ, being buried with Christ, and being raised with Christ.

Imagine being crucified with Christ. You're there in the crowd and all of a sudden they grab you and say, "you're going with Him!" They put a cross on your back and you stumble towards Golgotha. You get there and they throw Jesus down on His cross, and they throw you down too. You watch as they hammer the nails into Jesus, the same rhythm they use to hammer the nails into you. You look over and there Jesus is, dying as you die with Him. He cries out to the Father and breathes His last; and you breath your own last. They take you both down from the crosses, wrap you up, and take you into the tomb together. The tomb is closed and sealed.

(Now we must really put imagination to use, as we have died; but, for the sake of this picture we stay aware of what is happening.) You see that you have be

sake of this picture we stay aware of what is happening.) You see that you have been buried with Christ. You check a few hours later and see that you're both still dead. You look the next day and you're both still dead in darkness. Same thing the next night. Then you look on Sunday morning, and Jesus is looking back at you.

"You're alive?" you say to Jesus? "Yep," He says. "You wanna get out of here?" "Yes!" you say. And Jesus sits up, and you sit up with Him. He shakes off the dust and the grave clothes, and He walks right through the stone! He pokes His head back in and asks, "aren't you coming?" He raises you up, rolls the stone away, and you both walk out alive!

St. Paul declares that you have been buried with Christ through Baptism. That is what your Baptism is! Imagine the devil coming and saying to you, "You're going to have to die." We say, "No big deal, I've done that already. I already died with Christ! Buried with Him. Raised with Him. Never to die again."

Remember your Baptism!

It has been a busy year for our Early Childhood Program teachers and families. Though we have not been able to do our usual events and gatherings, we are so thankful to God for a healthy and successful school year even through the pandemic.

Our Early Childhood teachers and staff have also been working very hard this year on getting re-rated through the Great Start to Quality Program, which is an organization whose mission is to increase the quality of early childhood education though self-assessment followed by assessment from a Quality Improvement Specialist. As of this month, we have learned that we were **granted 5-star status yet again!** It is quite a feat



to have accomplished the highest possible quality rating during a pandemic which forced us to

change so much of what we do in our classrooms – to God be the glory. Early Childhood lead teachers also had the honor of being selected as presenters for the Michigan Association for the Education of Young Children (MiAEYC) State Conference this year. The conference was held virtually instead of in-person, but it was a great experience to share our knowledge on the subjects of childhood trauma and how to create an outdoor classroom with other early childhood educators throughout the state. What a blessed year!

Panther Camp is also gearing up for a busy and exciting summer this year! We are very excited to be able to offer camp this year after canceling the program last summer due to the COVID-19 pandemic. As the first day of camp nears, camp counselors are participating in trainings and other preparations, and families continue to register their campers. Plans for fun daily activities and weekly special events or field trips are made and materials are being purchased and prepared! We expect to welcome many new families and to welcome back our returning camp families. This year's camp is nine weeks long, beginning on Monday, June 14th and ending on Friday, August 13th. Together, as a school family, we saw Jesus in new and old light. Worshiping and praising the Lord, STEAM projects, sports, music, band, reading, and math...we experienced. We gained appreciation for volunteers who assisted with daily morning wellness checks, athletic antigen testing, and necessary cleaning requirements (Mr. Smelker and Mr. Dan...the MVPs of cleaning the school). Teachers taught online and in-person at the same time. Parents were cooperative and understanding as the circumstances changed and evolved. Teachers planned for inside and outside lessons and determined what was most essential for the development of their students.

Families who never knew of or considered Christian education came to our doorstep and learned of partnership between school and home. Families often commented, "The Our Savior community was family we didn't even know we were looking for all these years. Now we don't know what life would be like without OSL." As the school filled, faith was inspired and grew.

Thanks to the welcoming and invitation of our existing school family, new families found refuge and became restored with Christian purpose. New faith has led to countless baptisms and Christian faith in the homes. We did life together this year as we learned, lived, and shared Christ. Building the kingdom in a pandemic. 
