How do we honor the dead body of a Christian at the time of burial?

- 1. Commendation of the Dying / Sending Service
- 2. Comforting of the Bereaved
- 3. Funeral Service
- 4. Committal

Two purposes of a funeral:

- 1. Comfort
- 2. Profession of Faith

Notes about Cremation

- 1. We still want to honor the body and profess the resurrection
- 2. We lack customs and practices because of a historical stigma of cremation
- 3. A Memorial Service and Committal Service proclaim Christ's victory and look to the Resurrection
- 4. Other factors to consider ...
  - 1. Do not scatter
  - 2. Don't put it off
  - 3. Have a final resting place
  - 4. Mark with name and date
  - 5. Keep together
  - 6. Don't ignore death, but confront it with hope
