Advent Conspiracy

What is Advent all about? It is about taking time to slow down, wait, and anticipate Christmas, the birth of Jesus! But the rest of the world around us tends to take Advent as the time to rush, rush, and rush, so that we can spend, spend, and spend, to get stuff, stuff, and more stuff.

This year, we take a look at 4 different conspiracies of Advent, and see how we can take how the world expects us to live and act during this season, and turn our focus to Christ. There is always a focus on the hustle and bustle of the pre-Christmas season. Not this year. We turn our attention to Jesus, the true reason for the season.

And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another.

Every semester, I write letters of recommendation for my former students for scholarships and admissions to selective colleges.

Social media, Zoom, and livestreams, like actual windows, let us see people, but only a small part of them. I saw them, but I couldn't peel away the layers until I reached their compassion, insight, goals, and convictions. On the other hand, when they spent 16 weeks in my class I could peel away those layers. These windows weren't big enough to reveal what is unique and extraordinary about each person.

Hebrews reminds us that a window on a screen isn't enough. To worship fully means to show and feel love, to encourage and be encouraged, to grow in faith and to share faith. As such, the church makes us one and thus united for Jesus' glorious return.

John answered, "Anyone who has two shirts should share with the one who has none, and anyone who has food should do the same."

Is Your Giving Mandatory or Indicative?

"What shall we do?" was the question put to John the Baptist two verses earlier. Fortunately, in today's verse John provides a practical answer. But we must be careful not to view the examples as items on a religious checklist of dos and don'ts (the law), but rather actions that reflect a love for God (the gospel). He is not obliging everyone with two shirts in his or her closet to give one away. Rather, he is stating that giving to the poor out of our abundance demonstrates the love and mercy of God. In this case, the act of giving the shirt or meat is indicative of a humble and caring heart and not a mandatory righteous act we can boast about or use to earn our way to Heaven. As we seek to give to others this season, may our gifts not focus primarily on the dollar amount (the mandatory), but whether our giving demonstrates the love of God toward others (the indicative).

Lord, during this season, may we remember to do as the prophet Micah reminds us: to do justly, and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with You. Amen.

Christmas time is known to be a time of giving. However, Isaiah recounts that God first gave His Son for us. Moreover, His gift of Christ is so great, that Isaiah states that He will be called even "Mighty God." In other words, before Christ gave Himself for us on the cross, He first gave Himself in the Incarnation! When one imagines how much God gave up by assuming human flesh, it is clear why Christ's life is called His "Humiliation."

For God to assume human flesh is no small task. God, an uncreated and eternal being, becoming incarnate in human flesh, the form of us created people, not only speaks to God's love for humanity, but first to what He gave up. We did not deserve to be sent a Savior, and we still do not, but that didn't stop God from giving Himself for us. Not only did He give Himself for us, but abundantly, as Isaiah's stated titles make clear, "Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." So, this Christmas season, remember what God gave first in order to win our salvation for us to give to others.
