Vision Bridge 2025



"Where there is no vision, the people perish." (Proverbs 29:18) The founding families of Our Savior Lutheran Church and School had a



bold vision and launched a new church that would support a Lutheran grade school for the furthering of the Kingdom of God. In 2008, there was a new vision of a new church and school on 30 acres in a prime location. Today we continue the mission to learn, live, and share Christ. We do that in so many wonderful ways as a "churchschool."



This fall, our church leadership will be embarking on a journey to clarify and refine the vision for our church and school. This is building on the work that our Vision Team did last year, including the congregation survey. We are partnering with Pastoral Leadership Institute (PLI) in a program

called the "Vision Bridge." It is a 9-month process that helps refine and clarify a church's mission, vision, and values, and leads to a strategic plan for 5-10 years out.

A team of five leaders will attend two immersive sessions in Chicago with other congregations participating in the program. The leaders are Senior Pastor Bill Wangelin, Associate Pastor Chris Deneen, Principal Matthew Couser, Chairman of the Congregation Jake Kasper, and Chairman of the Spiritual Life Team, Jim Sundstrom. The immersive training sessions take place in September and March. This team will then relay the information back to our congregation and involve as many people as possible in the discussions as we prayerfully seek God's will.

As our church and school prayerfully considers the vision for our future, each family is invited to do the same. Our school theme, "Joining Jesus as a Family" invites us to consider how we can all participate in the mission of God as a church family. No matter what kind of earthly family we have, each home can be a beacon of light and hope, grace and truth. We pray that Jesus would shine brightly in our church and school and in each home as we join Jesus on His mission. We have more to do, and a greater impact to make. Can you see it? Because Jesus holds us in His loving hands, our future looks bright!

Joining Jesus as a Family



Our School theme this year, and a theme for much of our ministry focus this year, is "Joining Jesus as a Family". That is based on Greg Finke's book of the same name. In the book, he gives some great practical advice and keeps the focus on not just parenting, but discipline. You don't have to be a

mother or father to be a part of Joining Jesus as a Family! There are several levels and layers to the idea of "family." First of course, is the home. Mom, dad, and kids. But then take another step out, and think of our church family. Maybe you don't have kids, or are empty-nesters, but you can still be a mentor to another family, help kids, and just being visible in church helps others! And even beyond that, we are all part of God's family, which extends worldwide! We can all be a part of this amazing opportunity to Join Jesus as a Family.

One of the great things from the book, and even following Jesus' example, is the discipleship rhythm Finke talks about. Here it is, with my short hand:



Teach 'Em Show 'Em Send 'Em Circle Up!

Teach 'Em—Before your children, or disciples, can go out they need to know what

they need to know! Jesus didn't immediately send His disciples out into the world. He taught them! He worked with them. He explained what they would be doing. That's how parents and other mentors and family members can be!

Show 'Em—Your disciples (or children) need to see what they need to do. Jesus showed His disciples how to care for people and what His ministry looked like. He showed them what it was like to be a disciple of Jesus. Parents and mentors, you have the opportunity to show your family what it means to be on Team Jesus!

Send 'Em—Once you've taught, and once you've shown, it is time to let them on the loose! Still with some supervision, depending on what exactly the task is, but let them try it out! Jesus' disciples came back with some interesting results and stories. I'm guessing those you send will too.

Circle up!—Once they go, don't forget to talk about it! It is important to review what happened, what went well, what went not so well, and how you can improve next time.

This rhythm that Jesus used, is a practical way that we can Join Jesus as a Family here in this place and to the ends of the world!

Let's join Him.

- 6. One fun fact about you: I was "Bashful" the clown in my college church's clown ministry.


Getting to Know You: Vicar Paul & Bekah Engelhardt

Time Management

Have you ever had the opportunity to choose from a variety of activities on a vacation – maybe an all-inclusive resort or a cruise? Or can you recall a time when you were at an excellent food buffet with numerous options from which to choose? Those types of opportunities are fun!

Each day that we live is very similar to those two examples. We get to choose not only several activities for that day, but we also get to choose how we will approach each and every aspect of the day, each activity, each experience.

Recently I had the opportunity to hear from the Rev Dr Ryan Peterson at the Best Practices Heartland Conference in Frankenmuth. Dr. Peterson is a high energy and highly organized person. I've heard him

speak a few times about time management, and according to Dr. Peterson, there are five things to consider as we live out and manage each day.

- 1. Know the Why. We have to know the "why" when it comes to doing things. Why do we work where we work? Why do we maintain the daily schedule that we have? Why do we have or not have hobbies? If we do not have a good reason for why we do things, we might not have great motivation or enjoyment from doing them. Sometimes I feel like I need to stop and reevaluate why I am doing something. Is it helpful, necessary, stressful? These are real questions to consider as we go about our day to day activities. Knowing the "why" helps us determine if the things we occupy our days with are all necessary and fulfilling.
- 2. **Know What Drains Me and What Fills Me.** Hopefully you know yourself well enough to know what you enjoy and what you do not enjoy. Everyone certainly has to do things that they do not always enjoy (cleaning the bathroom, folding laundry, fixing something that is broken in the house, etc), but what about bigger things? Do you find yourself immersed in things each day or week that drains you too much? Consider changing that. Or at least consider balancing those things out with activities that "fill" you. For example, if you are more of an introverted person and you must spend each day talking to and dealing with people, that can certainly be draining. So what are you doing to get filled up again? Are you spending some time in solitude and quiet in order to recharge and fill up? Are you carving out time for activities and hobbies so that you can be filled?
- 3. **Embrace Your Season.** Are you a student? Enjoy being a student. Go to class, work hard, enjoy your social life, embrace high school or college or post graduate work. Embrace learning. Are you in the young family stage? Embrace seeing your children take their first steps. Embrace having young children at home (they seriously do grow













up fast). Embrace soccer and t-ball, dance lessons, and kids sleepovers. Are you nearing empty nest stage? Embrace conversations and activities with your almost-adult children.

Embrace a few more free hours in your schedule. Embrace perhaps more responsibilities at work. Are you retired? Embrace more time to choose things that you want to do. Embrace a slower pace. Bottom line, don't anxiously wait for the current season to be over. Embrace where God has you and enjoy each season of life as it unfolds.

- 4. **Budget Your Energy for the Day, Week, and Season.** Set priorities. Fill out a daily and weekly calendar. Coordinate with your spouse or friend so that what truly needs to be accomplished that day or week gets done. Consider this: What are your "Big 3 things" each day? What are those things that absolutely must get done that day? Maybe it is a celebration dinner, a meeting at work, or stopping by your child's school for a classroom presentation. Figure out how to manage your time so that you can devote your energy to the important things. Prioritize your day so that you have time and energy for the really important stuff!
- 5. Create Rhythms and Establish Rituals. This has to do with discipline. Disciple yourself to maintain routines. Be consistent with a wake up time and morning routine. Perhaps you could consider getting up 20 or 30 minutes earlier if you are a morning person. Start the day with reading or exercise, a brief walk, or sitting quietly some place gathering your thoughts. Establish healthy routines. Maybe you're more of a night person. What are some things you can do late at night each day before bed? Maybe you need to establish one or two things that help you have consistency in your day. Perhaps more consistent meal times or a mid-day activity. For families, I would suggest setting aside time each day for conversation and a meal. Worship together weekly. Study God's word. Memorize God's word. Keep it simple. You don't need to start running 10 miles each day or reading 10 chapters of the bible each day simply set aside some small blocks of time for doing consistent daily activities.


God gives us each day as a gift. Budget your time effectively so as to honor God and His good gifts.

Nurturing a Love for Reading at Our Savior Lutheran School

This school year, we are celebrating the joy and blessing of reading—not just as a skill, but also as a blessing from the Lord that shapes minds, warms hearts, and draws us closer to the truth of God's Word.

Our faculty has embraced this vision wholeheartedly. During our professional development, guided by literacy consultant Katie Davis, The Literacy Lady, we reflected on the importance of modeling reading for our students and teaching the sheer enjoyment of it. Together, we shared our personal reading passions and the books that have shaped us—reminding each other that when children see adults reading with joy, they begin to understand reading as a lifelong blessing, not a school assignment. Our teachers have also been busy updating their classroom libraries, giving them a fresh look to spark curiosity and draw students in to explore them throughout the school day.





I've personally been blessed by the encouragement of Pastor Wangelin and Pastor Chris, who invited me to read "Joining Jesus as a Family" by Greg Finke—a book that beautifully illustrates how faith conversations, Scripture, and acts of love can be woven into the ordinary rhythms of family life. I also recently read "Faith and Flourishing" by Dr. Bernard Bull, President of Concordia University, Nebraska, which offers rich, Christ-centered strategies for leading Christian schools with both excellence and purpose, challenging leaders to root every decision in the mission of the Gospel. Both books reminded me that reading can be more than informational—it can be transformational, shaping how we live, lead, and love in Jesus' name.


As a school, we want to pass this joy on to our students. With Davis' guidance, we are finding ways to keep reading accessible, enjoyable, and woven into daily life. Whether it is reading Scripture aloud as a family, getting lost in a good novel, or simply discussing a book at the dinner table, every moment with a book can become a moment to connect—with God, with

each other, and with the world, He created.

Let's join together in making this a year where books open minds, touch hearts, and strengthen our calling to "serve the Lord" (Joshua 24:15).

Here's how you can join the journey:

- Model joy in reading. Let your children see you cherish a book—whether it's a novel, a
 devotional, or a story you share aloud.
- Create moments of literary connection. Even five minutes of shared reading before bed becomes sacred space to pause, reflect, and connect.
- Lean into simplicity. Katie's resources often provide easy-to-use printables or booklists that make reading approachable and delightful: https://www.theliteracylady.co/
- **Celebrate curiosity.** Ask open-ended questions: "What did you wonder about today?" or "What part made you smile?" Let reading spark conversation, not just comprehension.

One year anniversary of the Student Support Center

Did you know that the former church nursery has been repurposed into the Student Support Center? In the summer of 2024, the space formerly used a nursery space during church services was remodeled so that it could be used on a daily



basis as a support center for Our Savior students.

The Student Support Center houses a space with a couch, other soft comfort items, sensory stations and tools, a small library, extra snacks for students who've forgotten, a private bathroom with extra toiletry items, extra clothes for the days when the unexpected happens, our ministry dog (Onyx), and serves as an office space for Education Specialist, Sara DeYarmond. During a typical school day, several students visit the office for sensory breaks, which can involve deep pressure tools, exercise routines, and other activities meant to support self-regulation. Middle school and upper elementary students will have meetings with Mrs. DeYarmond to discuss situations they need support with emotionally and/or academically. Representatives from different classes will come "check out" our ministry dog, Onyx, so he can spend some time in classrooms. Additionally, teachers will meet with Mrs. DeYarmond for instructional coaching or curriculum support.

On Sundays or evenings, this space is open to any who would benefit from using it, including the accessible bathroom. We are blessed to have a space like this for our students!
